# ABOUT KWANELE

Kwanele-Enuf is focusing its efforts on rallying each and every person, as well as stakeholders, to become agents of change within their communities with a view to crowding out perpetrators.

## WHO WE ARE AND HOW WE OPERATE

A project of the Kwanele-Enuf Foundation (IT 787/2013), Kwanele Enuf-is-Enuf is a campaign against all forms of gender-based violence (GBV). The incidence of GBV in South Africa has escalated to unprecedented proportions and the gruesomeness is unparalleled.

Kwanele-Enuf wants individual South Africans, families, communities, organisations, businesses, the judiciary and government to adopt a 'zero tolerance' approach to GBV by breaking chains of silence that have paralysed citizens who should be acting out against this scourge over many generations.

## KEY STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES

### OF KWANELE-ENUF:

1

To mobilise families, communities and other stakeholders in the public and private sectors to break the chains of silence shrouding rape, and thus address this scourge as a critical problem in need of urgent solutions with action plans to stop GBV.

2

To pressurise the justice system, through the Kwanele Enuf-is-Enuf campaign, and address the loopholes, which make it difficult to bring cases of rape and sexual violence to book.

3

To encourage the public, judiciary and government to declare GBV a 'national crisis' and develop a comprehensive plan to address the pitfalls in the societal, socio-economic and justice systems, which allow rape and abuse to continue within our communities.

# THE PILLARS OF KWANELE-ENUF:

## **ENUF RAPE AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE! NO MORE!**

We must aim for nothing less than zero tolerance of GBV.

## **ENUF SILENCE! SPEAK OUT!**

We need to break the chains of silence shrouding rape and GBV. The taboo, the stigma, the shame, the fear and protection of the family or community members are all ill-informed views that have enabled perpetrators of rape and sexual abuse to go unchallenged for many generations.

## **ENUF TOLERANCE! CONVICT PERPETRATORS!**

Perpetrators of rape and sexual violence are criminals who must be brought to justice. We must not protect them in any way – even if they live within our communities and are known to us.

## **ENUF APATHY! REPORT RAPE!**

Every one of us can do something to help stop rape and GBV. All structures of society must take appropriate action against perpetrators – from families to communities, the justice system and government. Don't wait until you or a family member falls victim.

## **ENUF FEAR! UPHOLD HUMAN RIGHTS!**

Every woman, man or child should enjoy their right to safety and security, and the peace of mind that comes with knowing that sexual predators will be punished and won't be treated with impunity.

### **KWANELE-ENUF OPERATES BY:**

- mobilising communities and members of the public through various media platforms, realising that radio and television are very powerful tools in disseminating information and encouraging dialogue;
- conducting radio interviews and thus addressing various topics related to GBV;
- an active website, and Facebook and Twitter profiles to create greater awareness and encourage a sharing platform; and

# THE PAST AND THE FUTURE

8 February 2013

Andy Kawa – a South African mother, businesswoman and mentor to several young people – endured ‘15 hours of hell’ when she was abducted and raped by a gang of men on Kings Beach in Port Elizabeth just over two years ago.

Many victims of rape and sexual violence, already struggling against the shame, succumb to this inexcusable silence – but not Andy. She thanks God that she has survived to tell her tale, and has made it her life’s mission to encourage other victims and survivors of rape and sexual violence to speak out through her organisation, Kwanele Enuf is Enuf.

“When I started Kwanele in 2012, my objective was modest: to provide a platform for people to speak out against rape and sexual violence, in support of many other organisations doing focused work in these areas,” says Andy. “Very quickly, however, my growing team of supporters and I realised that rape and sexual violence did not respect gender.”

Every woman, child and man is a potential victim from cradle to grave, she points out. “We have heard of victims just one month old and others 90 years old so we are all at risk – and we must all do whatever we can to stop the perpetrators and spread the word that rape and sexual violence are not OK.”

Kwanele has already initiated various awareness-raising initiatives with very encouraging results. The next big ‘push’ is to have every South African throw their weight behind a global anti-rape initiative called One Billion Rising, which is encouraging people around the world to rise up and take a stand on 14 February. “It’s the easiest thing in the world to give your support,” says Andy. “Simply register online and do something on that day – on your own, with colleagues, friends and family members – to take a public stand against rape and sexual violence – and break the chain of silence that protects the perpetrators of these vile crimes.”

# CHAIRMAN'S PERSPECTIVE

The financial year 2012-2013 was our maiden year as the Kwanele-Enuf Foundation.

**W**e concentrated on one project, the Kwanele-Enuf campaign. What was supposed to be localised work focused mainly on the Eastern Cape, and quickly found voice and platform nationally and internationally. The escalation of rage and deadly sexual violence in the country has seen South Africans becoming outraged and vocalising anger at the lack of safety and security in the country. Men and boys are also feeling the brunt as direct victims or affected family members and friends.

For our success, we thank our partners Russell and Associates, M&CSaatchi Abel and Spitfire Productions, who provide technical, communications, public relations and website support. Each of these companies has dedicated people handling Kwanele projects on a pro-bono basis. I truly appreciate and I am grateful for being treated with the same respect and professionalism as paying clients. This model of connecting with service providers and forming working relationships is worthy of special mention as it contributes to the viability of non-profit companies.

## **SOME OF THE NOTABLE HIGHLIGHTS OVER THE PERIOD:**

- In the lead up to my protest activities at Kings Beach in Port Elizabeth, I drew attention to cases that had not even been investigated and inefficient law enforcement. My activism was acknowledged by the Nelson Mandela Bay Metropolitan Municipality, which committed R38 million towards upgrading the Kings Beach area with specific focus on safety. The upgrade was dedicated to my plight, and the fight for safety and security at Kings Beach.
- On 9 August 2012, we marched in Motherwell, Port Elizabeth, to highlight the community's dissatisfaction with rampant GBV, as well as lassitude in convicting known perpetrators. The march was followed by a police forum at the City Hall where community members could present unresolved cases to the South African Police Service, particularly station commanders, and the National Prosecuting Authority.
- In October 2012, People Opposing Women Abuse (POWA) informed me that my case had been withdrawn in a trial I was not even subpoenaed to attend. The following month, I was fortuitously invited to speak at the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Rape Crisis Centre in Port Elizabeth. Knowing that the Minister of Justice would be there, I decided to use my case as an example in my speech about the loopholes in the justice system that rob victims of crime of their right to justice.

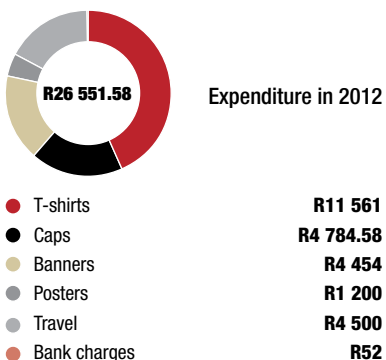
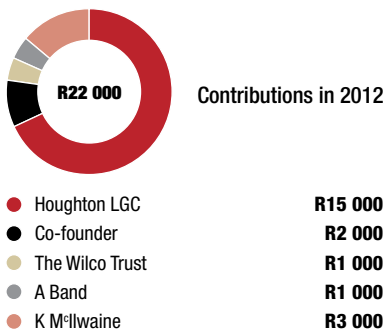


The Minister apologised to me in his speech and committed to reopening my case. Thanks to his acknowledgment of the systemic problems within our justice system, I am better able to help other victims whose cases are wrongfully withdrawn or closed.

- On 7 December 2012, I led my first march from Kings Beach, where I had been gang-raped, to the Humewood Police Station. The city's deputy mayor was at the vanguard, leading the charge with me. We handed a petition to the station commander at Humewood, which urged him to ensure that his teams of investigators would exercise due diligence in cases of rape and sexual violence.
- On 14 February 2013, I mobilised more than 3 000 people in the global One Billion Rising against GBV. I was involved in 'risings' at Wits University, St Mary's School and Kingsmead College, and at Russell and Associates. I also appealed to the President, the Minister of Women, Children & People with Disabilities, and the Minister of Justice to consider rising with the world against GBV. The President released a statement against GBV in his speech at the opening of Parliament on the same day.
- The response to my interviews on radio and TV has been overwhelming locally and internationally. To date, more than 524 people (36 of them male victims) have shared their personal experiences with me – some of them for the first time ever. Kwanele has become a trusted international and local voice on rape and GBV in the media.

Lastly but certainly not at the end of my list, I would like to thank friends and supporters who have contributed to Kwanele and participated in our activities. In so doing, they have validated the organisation and strengthened us to continue into the future.
